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Resilience Report

This weekend we honor the ending of slavery in this country and the official recognition of Juneteenth as a federal holiday. But before that, this week on Resilience Report we remind ourselves that seasonal disasters do not take a break as we recover from the impacts of a pandemic. Wildfires in the West and hurricanes in the South prompt a review of seasonal preparedness tools and recommendations on how to be ready with COVID-19 still lingering.



Persisting Racial Gaps in Vaccination Rates

Despite the decline in new cases, COVID-19 continues to disproportionately hit Black and Latino communities—with death rates for Black Americans much higher than any other group due to a <u>gap in vaccination rates</u>.

Delta: A Variant of Concern

With some states ending mask mandates and other restrictions, there is still concern about the Delta variant, which is more contagious and adverse. Full vaccination for protection is critical as trends in case rates may vary state to state despite high vaccination rates.

Countering Domestic Terrorism

<u>Domestic terrorism</u> has taken the limelight the past year from the riot at the Capitol to mass shootings and much more. The U.S. government has released a <u>national strategy</u> to combat domestic terrorism intended to disrupt and deter such incidents and address the root causes.

From Fire Season to Fire Year

An extreme drought coupled with dry weather and extreme temperature are putting <u>western</u> <u>US regions</u> at higher risk for wildfires. There are <u>challenges</u> to managing and maintaining wildfire response when fires are extending past the typical fire season.

As jurisdictions and citizens prepare for their seasonal risks, here are some friendly reminders and resources.

Public information and promotion of citizen preparedness doesn't have to be reinvented. These sites provide visually engaging and informative materials to help your community get ready for their disaster season.

- The CDC provides a public health lens on wildfire <u>smoke inhalation</u> reduction and <u>food/water safety</u> after hurricanes.
- CAL FIRE's <u>Plan Know Act</u> campaign uses digital, video, and graphic materials to promote defensible space and evacuation preparedness in their various toolkits.
- National Weather Service <u>NOAA</u> breaks hurricane preparedness into themes like determining risk and helping your neighbor while <u>Ready</u> has videos and tip sheets.
- <u>American Red Cross</u> covers not only hurricanes and wildfires but also places an emphasis on heatwave readiness with preparedness tools in numerous languages.

Facing Hazards in a Pandemic Era

Although vaccination rates keep rising, lasting impacts of the pandemic continue into our yearly disaster seasons. Here are some suggestions for facing these risks in a new era.

- Explore available mitigation and preparedness funding. 2021 might have brought elevated risks but it also brought money to the tune of \$41.8 million USDA <u>Environmental Quality Incentives</u>, a \$536 million CA <u>wildfire resilience</u> package, and \$1 billion for FEMA's <u>Pre-Disaster Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities</u>.
- Anticipate supply shortages. Supply chain bottlenecks and rising prices of materials can limit mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery efforts. Jurisdictions anticipating these costs may want to explore vendors and alternative supply chains for things like timber and wood, steel-mill products, etc.
- **Review recovery plans for equity.** Historically, disasters have unequally impacted the most vulnerable and disenfranchised populations. Unfortunately, disaster recovery also runs the risk of <u>perpetuating inequity and discrimination</u>. Assessing past recovery policies/practices and redesigning plans can help <u>refocus efforts on reducing disparities</u> and improving long term recovery for the whole community.
