Back-to-School: Safety First



Happy back-to-school! Most K-12 students across the U.S. returned to school in August or September, and as the school year moves toward full swing, the importance of the integration between emergency management and education is spotlighted in many categories. Below, we highlight several resources, guidance, and information for our readers - whether you play a direct role in school emergency preparedness or approach the topic from the parental or community member point of view.

• What you should know: Schools face immense challenges with implementing emergency preparedness programs. Many are reacting to incidents of different scopes and scales constantly. There are substantial resource and funding challenges for technology, mental health support, security, etc. Turnover plagues some opportunities for continuous staff training and exercises. Coordination with the community and local government requires continuous effort. Legal and regulatory requirements need to be followed. Furthermore, internal and external incidents frequently impact schools. Addressing these challenges requires a multi-faceted

- approach, which includes collaboration between school districts, emergency managers, first responders, and the community.
- Why this matters: Data from the National Center for Education Statistics that compares emergency planning for K-12 public schools in 2009/2010 versus 2019/2020 shows that improvements have been made in increased written procedures for various incidents. However, sizeable gaps in areas such as hostages, pandemic disease, and CBRNE threats or incidents remain. Concerns have also been raised about implementing planning efforts, both theoretically and in AARs following real-world incidents. For example, communication and visibility gaps resulting from technology challenges continue to hinder responses. In addition to grappling with increased violence, K-12 schools are also dealing with false active shooter or threat reports.
- Resources you should know about: School emergency preparedness is a complex topic. Below are just a few resources to get you started:
 - <u>Schoolsafety.gov</u> was launched in 2020 as a joint initiative between the U.S.
 Departments of Education, Health and Human Services, Homeland Security, and Justice. It distributes resources, guidance, and tools.
 - The <u>Readiness and Emergency Management for Schools (REMS) Technical</u>
 <u>Assistance Center</u> crafted EOP Interactive Tools to assist practitioners in
 developing EOPs that align with best practices.
 - The CDC addresses <u>school preparedness</u> holistically and provides suggestions for before, during, and after school emergencies.
 - The Bipartisan Safer Communities Act, signed into law in June 2022, includes the <u>Stronger Connections Grant Program</u>, which appropriated \$1B for local education agencies and many states are currently utilizing these funds to address "high-need" areas and priorities on the local level.
 - In California, Cal OES and the California Department of Education published a <u>Guide for Districts and Sites on California Emergency Management for</u> Schools.
