Status of the Global Pandemic Agreement and H5N1, and Tips for Infectious Disease Planning



On December 1, 2021, the World Health Assembly established an intergovernmental negotiating body (INB) to initiate a global process to draft and negotiate a <u>Pandemic Agreement</u>. Commonly referred to as the Pandemic Preparedness Treaty, the Agreement seeks to foster an "all of government and all of society approach, strengthening national, regional, and global capacities and resilience to future pandemics." A progress report was supposed to be shared at the <u>76th World Health Assembly</u> in May 2023 with the final outcome submitted for consideration by this year's <u>77th World Health Assembly</u>. It was announced before the Assembly that this <u>deadline would not be met</u>, and WHO member states <u>agreed</u> to finish negotiations for the Agreement within the next year.

The WHO has made some progress. It amended the International Health Regulations to define a pandemic emergency and to commit to strengthening equitable access to medical products and financing. However, negotiations for the Agreement have been challenging. It has been reported that "disagreements over sharing information about pathogens that cause pandemics and the technology used to fight them" is causing delays, as is the "creation of a new fund that would help boost pandemic-fighting capacities particularly in developing countries."

Progress on the Pandemic Agreement is especially important as the emergence of <u>H5N1</u> has re-sparked some public discourse on pandemics. It is too early to know with certainty what impacts H5N1 could have. Nonetheless, given the challenges on the international and national stages, pandemic planning at the state, regional, and local levels is critical. There is an opportunity to address locally what we cannot accomplish globally. Below are some tips from CONSTANT's Health Security Professionals:

- Re-examine COVID-19 After Action Report(s) (AAR): Many agencies conducted an AAR to formalize response and recovery strengths and areas for improvement, as well as an Improvement Plan (IP) to codify how to translate lessons learned to actionable improvements. This is an opportune time for agencies to look back at COVID-19 AARs and IPs and re-examine steps to incorporate COVID-19 insights into infectious disease preparedness postures.
- Ensure that Infectious Disease Plans Reflect Current Assumptions: Aspects like equity, scarce resource allocation, inter- and intra-agency coordination, use of non-pharmaceutical interventions, use of contact tracing, and mis-, dis-, and malinformation were at the forefront during the COVID-19 pandemic. State and local infectious disease plans should reflect updated assumptions, convene a multi-disciplinary planning team, and incorporate equity and sociocultural considerations. The plans should also revisit relationships leveraged during COVID-19 to confirm assumptions about partner capabilities to address certain aspects of response.
- Educate your Organization and Community on the Most Recent Public Health Prevention Recommendations: The CDC has stated that H5N1's current public health risk is low at time of writing. But, state and local agencies must arm themselves and the broader community with the appropriate knowledge of protective actions. This site also provides guidance to farmers, livestock owners, clinicians, and state health departments.
- Communication is Key: There has been <u>criticism</u> of the federal government's H5N1 communications thus far. With experts still unsure how the H5N1 outbreak in livestock will impact humans, disinformation and uncertainty are chief concerns. H5N1 communications are further complicated by the USDA, FDA, and CDC having jurisdiction over separate response areas. As federal agencies refine coordination efforts, state and local agencies can reassure their constituents that they will continue to share what they know with the public and are coordinating disease control and prevention.
